# The Elephant Man' Tackles Tolerance

entreville High's Cappies play is "The Elephant Man," and Director J. Mark Rogers has high praise for his ac-

"I think this could be the best show we've ever done at Theatre Centreville because of the subject matter and the commitment the students have shown to it," he

said. "It's one of those plays with such good roles that the actors can't wait to work on the scenes. And when you have that kind of passion, it always comes out well."

The curtain rises Thursday-Friday, April 30May 1, at 7:30 p.m., and Saturday, May 2, at 2 and 7:30 p.m. (The Cappies show is May 1). Tickets are \$8 at the door or at www.theatrecentreville.com.

The play features a cast and crew of 55 and takes place in 19thcentury England where the real "Elephant Man," John Merrick, lived. Portraying him is junior Steve Belden. "John's in his 20s and is afflicted by bone disorders and skin growths to the point where he has a grotesque physical appearance," said Belden. "He's immediately judged by society as being a lesser person even though, in reality, he's more intelligent than the general public and has a philosophical outlook on life. He's used to this treatment,

but it bothers him that people don't consider him an equal."

# Harper Pleads Guilty: Heroin, Gun Charges

ot only were the young men and women in the Centreville-based heroin ring involved with a deadly drug, they also risked their own lives when they purchased it from Antonio Harper.

Tuesday morning in federal court, their main

supplier — Harper, 33, of Waldorf, Md. — pleaded guilty to conspiring to distribute one kilogram or more of heroin and to possessing a firearm in furtherance of a drugtrafficking crime.

He said buyers would come to the driver's side of his car to make their purchases or get into the vehicle with him. He also admitted

that he often kept a .45-caliber handgun, either in his car or on his person. And when his gun wasn't tucked into his waistband, said Harper, "I just had it within arm's reach."

Furthermore, he ran a large-scale operation. He admitted to U.S. District Court Judge Leonie Brinkema that, in the space of a few years, he bought and distributed 15 kilos of heroin.

According to Fairfax County police narcotics detectives, a kilo of heroin sells for between \$70,000

and \$90,000. But when broken down and sold in lots of individual packets — many, as small as 1/10 gram each — the profit is astronomical. Detectives say a heroin dealer makes \$160,000 to \$200,000 profit per kilo. So 15 kilos fetched Harper a profit somewhere between \$2.4 million and

In court, April 21, Brinkema went over Harper's extensive plea document in detail, making sure he fully understood the ramifications of his actions. She told him that, for the heroin-distribution charge, he's facing a mandatory minimum sentence of 10 years in prison and could receive a maximum of life imprisonment.

"And do you understand that the court could impose a \$4 million fine?" she asked? "Yes, ma'am," he replied.

The firearm charge carries a punishment of as much as life in prison and has a mandatory minimum of five to seven years, depending on whether Harper just possessed a firearm or brandished it. He could also be fined \$250,000 for this charge. and this sentence must run consecutively to whatever time he receives for the drug-dealing offense.

"So the minimum time you're looking at is 15 years, no matter what," said Brinkema. "Parole is

not available in the prison system, so whatever term is imposed must be fully served. Your criminal history, the nature and quantity of the drugs involved, your role in the conspiracy — for example, if you were a leader in it, and if weapons or juveniles were involved — all affect the sentence you

Also taken into account, she said, will be community determent, plus the impact Harper's actions had on the victims. Besides the countless young people who became addicted to the heroin he supplied to their local dealers, four died.

HARPER DID get a break, however, because he was originally charged with distribution of one kilogram or more of heroin leading to death. In this case, the person who died after receiving a fatal dose in March 2008 was 19-year-old Alicia Lannes of Centreville.

But according to the plea agreement, explained Brinkema, Harper agreed that he distributed at least 10 but less than 30 kilograms of heroin and, in exchange, the penalty for heroin distribution resulting in death would not apply. By pleading guilty, he also waived his right to appeal his conviction or sentence — as long as it's within the federal sentencing guidelines.

"In exchange for your guilty plea, the government will not further prosecute you in connection with this case in the Eastern District of Virginia," said the judge. "But it does not protect you from prosecution in any other district." She also said Harper must testify in other criminal proceedings in connection with

this conspiracy, and to grand juries, as required.

Brinkema told him he's subject to forfeiture of any property obtained from his drug dealing or used in its furtherance, such as his car. And, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Daniel Grooms, "We anticipate forfeiture of the firearm seized from Mr. Harper, the day of his arrest."

Count one of his plea agreement, Brinkema told Harper, states that, between 2006 and Nov. 19, 2008, "You, Skylar Schnippel and others had an agreement to distribute one or more kilograms of heroin. Count five states that, on Nov. 19, 2008, you knowingly and intentionally possessed a firearm in furtherance of the drug-trafficking crime in count one."

She asked Harper, "Why did you feel it was necessary to have a weapon?" He replied, "I was shot in 1992, so I had it for protection." When she asked if he also had other firearms during his drug dealings, he denied it. But Grooms said that wasn't so: "We have descriptions of multiple firearms — other pistols he had, so we have an issue with that [state-

According to the statement of facts signed by Harper and filed April 21 in U.S. District Court in Alexandria, "Harper carried a handgun that was clearly visible tucked in his waistband. When Harper conducted deals with customers, he often displayed the firearm by placing it in view on the seat of the car or on his lap."

When Brinkema asked him if the gun's handle was showing during drug deals, he said, "Probably so" and admitted keeping his weapon "within arm's reach." She also questioned Gimiabouruthe heroin. 4

### Pair Charged with Burglary

Two men have been charged with burglary after allegedly entering a Little Rocky Run couple's open garage and stealing a woman's purse from an unlocked car parked inside. Fairfax County police responded to the 13900 block of Springstone Drive for a report of a man looking into cars on Sunday, March 29, around 9 p.m. They were also given a description of his vehicle — a 1996 Chevrolet Camaro — which they found, unattended.

An investigation determined that several items inside the car were stolen from a house nearby and, as officers were contacting the victims, they saw a man walking along the street and stopped him. Joseph Beruete, 26, of 4420 Village Drive in Fairfax, was arrested and taken to the Adult Detention Center where he was charged with drunk in public.

Police say further investigation led to additional charges for Beruete and also determined that a second suspect was involved in the burglary. On April 7, they arrested Beruete and Michael Chase Nelson, 24, of 6829 Malton Court in Centreville's Crofton Commons community, and charged each man with burglary and two counts of grand larceny. Beruete has a May 12 court date, and Nelson, May 27.

### Two Years Prison for Attempted Burglary, Credit Card Fraud

A Chantilly man who tried to break into an adult-video store has been sentenced to two years in prison. He is Joshua Nowlin, 21, of 13292B Leafcrest Lane, No. 203, in the Shenandoah Crossing Apartments.

The incident occurred Sept. 24, 2008, at the MVC Late Night Video store at 14021 Lee Jackson Memorial Highway in Chantilly. Fairfax County police responded to a burglar alarm around 3:30 a.m. and discovered damage to the front door. They found Nowlin nearby, and an investigation led to his arrest on a charge of attempted burglary.

On Feb. 2 in Circuit Court, he pleaded guilty to that charge. plus credit-card fraud, possession of burglary tools and a misdemeanor offense of trespassing. He returned April 9 for sentencing, and Judge Jan Brodie sentenced him to a total of two years in prison.

# Brooks Pleads Guilty to Five Larcenies


According to Fairfax County police, a Centreville woman, 45, started her car in the 13900 block of Deviar Drive and left it unattended — with her purse inside — while she went back inside her house. Some 10 minutes later, she discovered her car was gone

Investigation revealed that her credit card had been used at a store in Fair Lakes, and officers found Brooks

28-year-old man has pleaded guilty to five in a parking lot — standing next to the stolen car, a 2003 Chevrolet Trailblazer. They arrested him and charged him with five counts of grand larceny and one count each of credit-card larceny, fraud and forgery.

Seven of his charges were later dropped but, on March 16, the grand jury indicted him on four counts of larceny w/intent to sell, plus one count of creditcard larceny. He pleaded guilty to all five offenses, April 6, in Circuit Court before Judge Jonathan Thacher and is scheduled for sentencing on June 12.

understanding and seeing past your first impression of a person to truly get to know them."

ROSS, the Elephant Man's manager, is played by senior Neema Atri. "He's my carnival act, and my goal is to make some money off him," said Atri. "I'm desperate and deceptive. I feed and take care of him and give him a place to sleep, but claim all the money for myself. But once I realize he's more of a liability, I give up on him."

Atri's enjoying his part because "villains are always a lot of fun, and Ross doesn't know he's doing anything wrong because he's only thinking of himself." Toughest, he said, is maintaining Ross's Cockney accent. But once he got it

down, it was rewarding "because his voice — low, thick, grungy and poor Cockney — also tells a lot about his character."

As for the audience, Atri says, "It's a mature show, and looking beyond what you see with your eyes is a classic lesson. And I can't wait to see all the carnival members on stage."

Senior Christine Tillema plays Nurse Sandwich, who tries to take care of Merrick in the hospital. "But when she seems him, she realizes she's not as tough as she thought and she runs away screaming," said Tillema. "Initially, though, she's strong and can handle anything."

Tillema said it's challenging to go through such a shift in personality, but fun. The hard part is "conveying who she is in such a short amount of time," she said. "But she's different from characters I've played before because she's much less nurturing and caring and more strong and determined."

She said the audience will like the play's message of not judging a book by its cover because "the Elephant Man is actually a smart, warm and interesting person. But not many people give him a chance to show what he's like on the inside."

**ONE WHO DOES,** however, is Mrs. Kendall, an actress, portrayed by senior Annie Paradis. "She's his connection to the outside world and the first woman who's ever spoken with him and isn't afraid of his appearance," said Paradis. "They form a friend-ship — which is more romantic in Merrick's eyes — and it allows him to become more human through their communication with each other."

Paradis said Kendall is used to being charismatic and flirtatious and putting on an act for others. "But she's respected and genuine with him and doesn't need to [pretend]," said Paradis. "It's hard fusing together all those characteristics to make her an independent woman, and it's also tough doing a proper British accent. But I like how she speaks her mind,

is honest and has good intentions." She said the play makes a statement and will resonate with the audience regarding the need for honesty and truth.

Senior Torin Van Houten plays Dr. Treves, who takes Merrick in and tries to help him live a comfortable life in the hospital where he doesn't have to be gawked at by the public. "But then Treves realizes he's doing it to further his own career, since he's taking on such an abnormal case," said Van Houten. "I love it. It's easily the most challenging role I've ever played."

He said doing a believable British accent for two hours, and figuring out how to relate to the extreme characters around him, is difficult. But, he added, "It's a lead role and I really appreciate the challenge and how this journey really changes Treves."

He's also enjoying working with his fellow cast members. "All the leads were pretty close friends before the show," said Van Houten. "And they're all so talented that it's a rewarding experience to act with your friends and see them do so well." As for the play, he said, "Besides the shocking subject matter, I think the audience will be attracted to our ability to humanize all these characters and make them relatable."

Director Rogers put on a one-act version of "The Elephant Man" in 2001 and, he said, "The kids had so much fun with it that I decided to do a full-length version. It allows the students to learn a British dialect and take on the physical challenges of the time period and the characters, many of which are freaks. And it's very dramatic — which the kids always love to do and really sink their teeth into."

He said the story's also socially relevant because "education is more inclusive today. At the time of the Elephant Man, if people were born with any kind of physical or mental deformity, they were institutionalized. Whereas now, we mainstream them and give them opportunities to learn and grow. They're no longer freaks — just people who are different — so we've come a long way."

"The agreement says you obtained the heroin from sources of supply in Washington, D.C., and Maryland and then broke down and repackaged it into packages containing 1/10 gram," said Brinkema. "What quantities of heroin did you usually purchase at a time?" Said Harper: "One hundred or 200 grams

at a time."

"What total amount of heroin do you think you bought from your suppliers," she asked. "Fifteen kilos altogether," he answered.

Brinkema said Harper distributed it to people including J.R. Quick, David Schreider, Lokesh Rawat,

Kevin Zuiker and Angela Aycock. Harper said he didn't know them by name, but knew they came from Virginia. (Quick, Schreider and Rawat have already received prison sentences for their roles in the conspiracy; Zuiker and Aycock will be sentenced soon and Schnippel is slated for a May 4 trial).

Accepting Harper's pleas, the judge said, "There's more than enough evidence to find you guilty of both crimes." She then set his sentencing for July 17.

Afterward, Greg Lannes, Alicia's father, called it

"unfortunate" Harper didn't plead guilty to heroin distribution causing death, but he and his wife were glad Harper pleaded guilty to the other offenses, "which will result in a serious prison sentence."

"The fact that he is not on the street distributing this terrible drug right now is comforting to our community," said Lannes. "Harper's distribution of heroin has destroyed many lives. We are confident the judge will look at all the evidence and the impact to our community and sentence Harper to an appropriate

### Beyond Gun Rhetoric

To the Editor:

As a parent who lost a precious daughter on April 16, 2007 at Virginia Tech, I would like to dispel comments made by detractors of this tragedy and whose intent is to confuse and divert attention from all of the issues revealed.

Seung Hui Cho did not buy his gun from a gun show. I believe everyone is in agreement on that. But he could buy his gun due to a defect in the mental health reporting law at the time. Imagine that, a loophole that our Governor,

Attorney General and legislators had to close. Let's just call it the mental health loophole.

There are claims that some families of those that suffered loss or injury that day, and our tragedy, are being politically exploited. Well, there is a difference. The system can use us or we can use the system to help correct the faults we discovered as a result of April 16, 2007, and we will not ignore other loopholes that we have discovered on our journey for truth. One of those discoveries being the gun show loophole. This is one issue that we, as Virginians, must work on together.

As a result of April 16, we have helped support the passing of two federal laws, three executive orders and 23 state laws (mostly in the mental health arena). Therefore, the tragedy itself became inherently political. Imagine, the infusion of \$42 million alone into the mental health system that had been ignored for years and the legislative flaws that were revealed that had to be acted on. We do not do this for self-aggrandizement. We have already paid the ultimate price. And we do thank Governor Kaine and our legislators for giving us voice and allowing us to be heard so that others may not lose their loved ones to weak laws. Some vision and foresight is required by government instead of reactionary and divisive politics.

The background check by private sellers at gun shows is not about the 2nd Amendment or gun control. These are false representations of the position that are used to divert public attention and instill fear. It is not about controlling guns but is about verifying unchecked purchasers. Its focus is simply public safety. Though closing the gun show loophole may not prevent the illegal purchase of guns entirely, it can make it harder for those ineligible from doing so. It is not about being perfect but it is about how both sides of this issue can work together to make it harder for ineligibles to buy guns so that our families, schools and communities are safer.

Political dogma and rhetoric aside, it is the duty of every citizen of this great Commonwealth to be responsible to one another, including private sellers at gun shows and gun show operators.





# Headstrong Chargers Press On

Concussions and other injuries aren't enough to stop Chantilly girls' soccer team.

hantilly senior Cortlyn Bristol gave a literal meaning to the soccer term "header" without even knowing she did so. During a 1-0 win over Langley on Friday, March 20, Bristol went up to try and head a ball, the sort of 50-50 ball that she, as a midfielder, expects to control.

Unaware that one of her teammates was trying to do the same thing, Bristol jumped and her head made contact with the ball. The unfortunate part, though, was that another head — that of the teammate — made contact with Bristol's.

"It wasn't even the opposite team," Bristol joked. "It was awful."

But she felt fine. So Bristol, who had never missed a start during a prolific career that has resulted in a soccer scholarship to William & Mary, played on. She finished the game and even played five more with her club team, FC Virginia, that weekend.

The next week, she started to experience a series of headaches after a 1-1 tie with South County on Tuesday, headaches that Bristol, while sitting inside an office next Chantilly's gymnasium Monday afternoon, insisted were more subtle and oddly located toward the top of her head.

Shortly after the South County game, Bristol, who had 12 goals and five assists last year en route to earning first team All-Concorde District and All-Northern Region honors, was diagnosed with a mild concussion and missed the Chargers' 2-0 win over Herndon on March 30.

"It was the worst thing in my whole life," Bristol said.

The headaches soon subsided and Bristol returned to practice later that week. And as part of a typical warm-up drill, Bristol made sure the concussion, which she now speaks comically, was officially behind her.
