

Great Falls Up for Grabs? 2009

Hotly contested race for the 34th District.

y about 10 a.m. on Nov. 3, around 200 of the ap proximately 3,500 residents registered to vote at Forestville Elementary in Great Falls had cast ballots.

"It's a little more constant than what we've experienced in an off-year election," said Dudley Tademy, the polling place's precinct chief, adding that it was probably too early to read much into the numbers.

During the previous gubernatorial election cycle in 2005, Great Falls' four precincts reported voter turnout of approximately 45 percent, similar to the average turnout across Fairfax County and Virginia as

But unlike 2005, when now retired Del. Vince Callahan (R-34) ran unopposed, Great Falls has a hotly contested local election. Del. Margi Vanderhye (D), seat in 2007, faced Republican lican opponent. opponent Barbara Comstock.

The Vanderhye-Comstock showdown was one of the most expensive delegate contests in the history of Virginia, with each candidate spending over \$570,000 by Oct. 21, according to the Virginia Public Access Project, a nonpartisan organization that manages campaign finance in the Commonwealth.

The 34th District, which also includes parts of McLean and Herndon, has leaned Democratic in recent elections but it is still one of the most conservative delegate seats in Fairfax County. Great Falls, in particular, has flipped flopped between Democrats and Republicans in recent elections.

Despite winning the overall race, Vanderhye lost every Great Falls precinct to Republican opponent Dave Hunt in 2007. Supervisor John Foust (D-Dranesville), who beat an incumbent Republican to win the election, only won one Great Falls precinct.

Republican presidential candidate John McCain also beat Obama in all four Great Falls precincts during the 2008 elec-

But in the 2005 attorney general race, where 2009 gubernacandidates McDonnell and Creigh Deeds faced off the first time, Deeds, a Democrat, won three of the four Great Falls precincts easily. Gov. Tim Kaine (D) also won who succeeded Callahan to the all four Great Falls precincts House of Delegates 34th District four year ago against a Repub-

Celebrating the Farm

New riding facilities open at Turner Farm Park.

nyone driving by Turner Farm Park might look at the seemingly barren land and not think twice about its usage. Just beyond the barren looking hill, however, lies an entire equestrian park few know about: a well manicured trail about fifty yards that leads to a brand new, 250 by 200 feet multi-purpose equestrian arena, filled professional jumps, all-weather footing, and dressage capabilities.

The newly completed equestrian ring opened in June 2009 after years of preparation and planning by various Great Falls organizations, including Great Falls Horse Society, Great Falls Citizen Association and Fairfax County Park Authority.

The use and future of the Turner Farm Park land has been a disputed case since 1994 when The Friends of Turner Farm commission was created to try to save the land from development. Molly Hockman, a member of The Great Falls Horse Society, an organization of about 150 people, was involved in helping to preserve the land. "We wanted to preserve the farm-like atmosphere in Great Falls," she said. "We felt that creating a horse facility would be the best way to maintain the roots of rural Great Falls in the midst of all the development in the area."

WITH THE HELP of the Brogue Charities and other community organizations, The Friends of Turner Farm were able to raise \$10,000 dollars in donations, which was

Community members then collaborated to create a horse facility that best suited the needs of the community. Now almost 10 years later, Turner Farm Park is host to a professional riding ring, 30-acre equestrian course, and a round pen for lunging and training, all free for the public to use. With no on-site horse stables, riders must bring their horses and riding equipment in trailers and park in the parking lot.

Cameron Rouse, 14, of Vienna, and Andrew Fox, 14, of Herndon frequently bring their horses to Turner Farm to ride. "The ring is excellent for jumping. All of the jumps are brand new and the ring has great footing, even after it has rained. It provides a great alternative for riding when the grass is wet where I ride elsewhere," said Cameron. Many riding instructors meet their students at the park

met by a grant of equal amount by the to give lessons, adding to the diversity of users of the park.

> ADDITIONALLY, the 30-acre cross-country course provides another alternative for riders and non-riders alike. "The cross-country course is sheltered from development and noise," said Hockman. "It's for anyone's use, really. You don't have to be a rider to benefit from this park. Many people often walk their dogs around the beautiful land." Less equestrian-inclined citizens can take advantage of a playground and an observatory on the premises as well.

Few other equestrian parks are sponsored by the Fairfax County Park Authority, including Frying Pan Park in Herndon. Turner Farm also includes composting areas to keep up with maintenance of the site. "We try to keep the ring and the equipment as nice as we can," said Andrew. "It's evident there was a lot of thought put into this facility and we want to keep it as great as it is now."

GFCA To Discuss Route 7 Project

The Virginia Department of Transportation is conducting a public information meeting on the Route 7 Widening Project at Georgetown Pike on Wednesday, Nov. 18, 6-8 p.m. at the Aldrin Elementary School Cafeteria, 11375 Center Harbor Road, Reston. Plans for the project will be posted on the VDOT Web site: http:// www.virginiadot.org/projects/ northernvirginia/ route 7 widening.asp. The Great Falls Citizens Association (GFCA) will be discussing this project at its General Membership meeting Tuesday, Nov. 10 and its Transportation Committee meeting Tuesday, Nov.17.


According to the most recent data provided to GFCA, VDOT is projecting a 20 percent increase in the traffic proceeding east on Route 7 through the Georgetown Pike intersection and continuing toward Tysons Corner. However, they are showing a much greater 57 percent increase in the vehicles turning left from eastbound Route 7 onto Georgetown Pike. This increase is to be accommodated by doubling the length of the existing left turn lane and adding a second lane of equal length, i.e., a near quadrupling of the existing turning capacity.

More than 2,000 citizens have signed the "Safe the Pike" petition that objected to this VDOT proposal. The citizens are encouraged to attend and bring their questions and concerns to their state and county elected officials and agency staff.



OPINION Time To Get Serious

Opportunity to use science to clean up the Chesapeake Bay, Potomac River.

he Potomac River provides a beau tiful backdrop to so much of North ern Virginia, from the rugged ar eas of the Potomac Gorge from above Great Falls down into Arlington to the broad tidal Potomac from Alexandria, then meandering down to the Chesapeake Bay.

The river and the bay are an important part of our local identity, part of our local heritage and a remarkable environmental and recreational resource.

EDITORIAL While over the past decade, federal and local governments plus environmental groups and activists have devoted much energy and attention to the health of the Chesapeake Bay, we have been losing ground. This is despite a clear understanding of the pollution problems and the exact limits that would be required to make the bay healthy. There are three major sources of pollution in the bay, sewage treatment plants, agriculture and stormwater runoff from roads, driveways and parking lots. The resulting growing influx of

"nutrients" from these sources causes an unnatural growth of aquatic plants in the bay, absorbing oxygen and then dying off, creating massive, floating dead zones where no life can

Now, new legislation, the Chesapeake Clean Water and Ecosystem Restoration Act of 2009, proposed in both the House and the Senate, has a chance to make all the difference for the

> bay — and also much of the Potomac River from Arlington and Alexandria on

While the bills would ensure that the six states in the bay watershed and the District of Columbia develop and implement detailed plans to reduce pollution sufficiently to achieve the Bay-wide reduction targets for nitrogen, phosphorus, and sediment by 2025, it also has national implications as a blueprint for improving the health of other wetlands and waterways around the county.

U.S. Rep. Gerry Connolly, an original cosponsor of legislation to reauthorize the Chesapeake Bay program, successfully urged the inclusion of language that will limit runoff into the bay from impervious surfaces, the one source of pollution that has continued to grow dramatically along with population growth around the bay watershed. Connolly's capacity to relate complex problems to solutions that would work in local government land use and stormwater regulation is invaluable in this. U.S. Rep. Jim Moran and U.S. Rep. Chris Van Hollen are also cosponsors of the bill in the House. U.S. Sen. Ben Cardin (D-Md) is author of the bill in the Senate; Virginia's U.S. Senators Mark Warner (D) and Jim Webb (D) should get on board as well.

The legislation proposed would connect the scientific understanding of the pollution levels with incentives, penalties (withholding of federal money if standards aren't met) and flexibility (interstate nutrient trading provisions) to achieve the necessary levels.

While this legislation is aimed at the Chesapeake Bay, local streams and rivers will also benefit in the process.


emember reading those tedious books for your English class? Those endless classics like "Lord of the Flies" and "Pride & Prejudice?" English teachers to this day assign the very

same novels for their classes, but their demographic has changed.

On Sparknotes' Wiki page, it says that many parents and teachers claim that their children and students are using the sites "as a replacement for reading assignment or to cheat during tests ... using cell phones with Internet access."

Easy, legal and fast new Internet sites like Sparknotes, Wikipedia, Book Rag and other book summary sites have now popped up online with everything over-committed teens need. These sites have every option, from plots summaries and essay writing help to character relationships and individual chapter quick reads. Image all of Geoffrey Chaucer's Canterbury Tales finished in 10 minutes.

Talley Murphy, a Great Falls 14-yearold Marshall freshman, remembers what happened in a friend's eighth grade English class and how the students used the Internet to do it the easy way. "To Kill a Mockingbird" had TEEN PERSPECTIVE



Talley described as her teacher began checking their assignment, then stopping and announcing to the students that he in fact had written the Sparknotes page on "To Kill a Mockingbird." While it's hard to know whether the teacher really wrote the notes, or simply knew how to make the guilty students confess, it shows how many teachers feel about the use of those sites.

The idea of summing up a book fast is hardly new. Cliff Notes, those yellow pamphlets that say things like: "Read less," "Only the important stuff," or "Make a long story short," have been around since 1958. While many people use the summaries "to help ... understand complex works" or even as a study guide, there are many critics who dislike the concept of an easy way out saying "they let students avoid even reading them," Cliff Note's Wiki page says.

Child Deaths To the Editor: Last week, a new report by the advocacy group Every

Child Matters focused on the disturbing rise of child deaths in the United States due to maltreatment. Local reports earlier in the year also pointed to an increase in family violence across Northern Virginia as well.

What readers need to know is that the majority of children who die from maltreatment had no prior contact with child protective services. We need to understand that each one of us is responsible for the children in our protective services — and that we each have the power to prevent these tragedies.

Another grim statistic? Over 75 percent of the children who die from maltreatment are under the age of 4. We must provide new parents in our community with support, including parenting classes and support groups. early childhood home visitation and universal access to affordable health and mental health services.

The report (released on Capitol Hill) calls for more federal funding — which is certainly critical as governments on every level face tough budget cuts. But this report should also be a wakeup call to the individual community member. When we see a sign of abuse and neglect right here in our own neighborhood, are we pausing for that child long enough to report it to Child Protective Services? When we know a new parent struggling with the stress of young children, are we pausing long enough to offer support or suggest they contact one of the many organizations in Northern Virginia offering parenting resources?

Perhaps while the federal government figures out the funding for this issue affecting millions of children and parents across the country, we each could be having an impact on just one right here in our own community.





Artist Depicts Old Great Falls

Regional landmarks long gone and those about to disappear are displayed at library, tavern.

fter Pat Mercer Hutchens painted an old Great Falls house that was slated for demolition, a local paper ran a story about the building and it was saved. That was about a decade ago. Now, that house is Dante's Ristorante, and Hutchens has since made dozens of paintings of historic locations around Great Falls and the surrounding re-

Many of those paintings were on display at the Great Falls Library for the last month, and several now comprise a permanent exhibit at the Tavern at Great Falls.

"I've always had an interest in preserving things like that," she said. But at the time that she painted the house that would later

become a Great Falls institution, she primarily painted old cars instead of buildings, with a long series of large construction artwork that used paint, found objects and other media to depict head-on views of cars from the 1920s, '30s

and '40s. That came to an end after the 9-11 attacks.

Hutchens was deeply affected by an article she read about the people who chose to jump from the World Trade Center towers as they burned and fell. "I couldn't get it out of my mind. I couldn't sleep for days," she said. She created a work depicting two of those people. After completing the piece, she said, "I pretty much went into hibernation for a while and then started painting local things."

WHAT BEGAN as a series of 20 paintings became 50 paintings, and then 70. "I just got into it and I never stopped," she said.

In a painting of the house that once stood where the Olivers Corner commercial area is now located, at the intersection of Walker Road and Georgetown Pike, she inserted Fantastic, a horse from the Great Falls-based Lift Me Up therapeutic riding program. And an old-time car of the sort she used to paint appears in, among others, a picture of the Triangle Store that once stood at Triangle Corner, now Seneca Square Shopping Center. Another features prominently in a picture of Tysons Corner in the 1950s. "These two little stores were the only thing there," Hutchens said, indicating her rendition of a filling station and a small neighboring shop.

Most of the cars in her paintings are candy-apple red. Most of the roads are dirt, and most of the scenes are surrounded by empty fields or forest. "This was all country out here. You had to come on a dirt road to get here," Hutchens

Among the structures she has painted that Great Falls residents would recognize more easily are a house that is now for sale on Colvin Run Road, depicted when the road was part of Leesburg Pike, the late 19th-century barn that was recently moved back from the western stretch of Georgetown Pike and the Great Falls Fire Station. "They're going to tear down the fire station, so that's why I painted that," Hutchens said. Parked in front of the station in her painting are its original fire trucks, which she painted from a picture

given to her by local historian and former volunteer firefighter Milburn Sanders. Hutchens said she had been receiving an increasing number of pictures from the area's longtime residents.

EVEN THE OLDEST residents might not recognize other build-


ings that were displayed in her exhibit at the library, such as the commissary on River Bend Road where farmers once bought supplies, the Elkins Train Station that was the last stop before Georgetown Pike on the line that became Old Dominion Drive and the Springvale Post Office that was operated at the intersection of Georgetown Pike and Springvale

Road from 1844 until 1917.

The paintings are all the same 8 by 10-inch size. Hutchens said uniform sizing made for easy exhibition and did away with the problem of how to frame the works, as they all could use the same frame. or Langley High girls' volleyball coach Susan Shifflett, juggling her line-up has been a big challenge late in the season. Because the Saxons, like so many high school athletic teams across Northern Virginia, have had to battle seasonal illnesses to many of their players, finding cohesiveness on the floor has been a challenge.

"It's been a very weird season for us," said Shifflett, whose overall roster consists of just three seniors. "I've never had a season where so many girls were sick. I don't think we've had the same line-up for two consecutive nights in a row."

The coach said about half of her 12-member varsity roster has been hit by some sort of bug.

"It's not swine flu," she said. "We've had bronchitis and real bad colds where they've had to miss school. We're healthy now. Hopefully, no one else will go down."

Going into this week, Langley was 11-5 overall and was carrying a four-match win streak. Team wins last week came over nonregion, private school opponent Maret School (Washington, D.C.) on Oct. 27 and Liberty District, cross-town rival McLean. The Saxons won both home matches by scores of three games to none.

Shifflett, whose team concluded the regu-

lar season at 11-5 with the victory over McLean, said the home match against the Highlanders was particularly exciting with a big, enthusiastic crowd on hand.

"It was a high pressure situation," said Shifflett, of the friendly rivalry meeting between the Highlanders and Saxons. "We get more fans

[when McLean visits]. McLean is so fired up to play us. It adds an extra element to the game. [Whether McLean or Langley is] good or bad it doesn't matter, there is an element of surprise. You never really know what that energy will bring."

Langley concluded the regular season as second place finishers behind first place Stone Bridge in the district standings. Last year, the Saxons and Bulldogs met in the district tournament finals with Stone Bridge taking the finals meeting. A good chance exists that the two teams will meet again in this year's tournament title match.

A Non-Biting **Commentary**

For as long as I've been biting my nails (my entire life) and for all the unconfirmed underlying reasons, anxiety and nervousness must have, on some level, played a role. However, I was never counseled, never psychoanalyzed (by a professional, that is) and never broken of the habit. Until, extremely oddly enough, recently when I was diagnosed with stage IV lung cancer at 54. You would think, that under these less than ideal circumstances, biting my nails would be all that I would be doing. But it's not, hardly at all. In fact, I even joked to my wife, Dina, that I might need to schedule a manicure appointment. (If I did, it would be a first.)

I wouldn't say I'm at peace over the diagnosis, though. I mean, it was totally unexpected. There's no cancer in my family, both my parents lived well into their 80s (in relatively good health) and I'm a lifelong nonsmoker; never having smoked even one ciga rette in my pre- and post-adolescent years. Yet, that's the jackpot in which I find myself immersed: tumors, chemotherapy, oncologists, diagnostic scans, lab work, diet and lifestyle restrictions/modifications, work issues, money issues, etc. ("So young, so handsome, well, so young, anyway," Curly Howard of The Three Stooges was looking in the mirror admiring himself, considering death, when he spoke these words, a sentiment I completely embrace, context notwithstanding.)

It's ironic when you think about it, though If ever there was a time to exhibit a behavior born out of anxiety and nervousness, one would think a stage IV lung cancer diagnosis out of the blue would be it. My nails should be bitten down to the nub by now. Heck, they used to be when I was completely healthy (or clueless, depending on your perspective/assessment), but they're not. They appear almost normal. My nails now need to be trimmed regularly and my cuticles are not all torn up, swollen and bleeding. It's an incredible sight, really, for me and my fingers I only wish my parents were alive to see it. (Oh, how they were frustrated by my constant gnawing of my fingers/nails/cuticles.) Although, given the fact that they would then also have the knowledge that their "baby" "Some baby," as my father always joked) had been diagnosed with "incurable" lung cancer, I can't see how this juxtaposition of good and bad would have enhanced their golden years.)

Nevertheless, they would have offered me the kind of love and support and encouragement I no doubt would have benefited from. All things considered, they may not have lived to see me not biting my nails, but had they lived, the underlying reason for the change - my diagnosis, might have hastened their deaths, and doing anything that might have done so would not have been a preferred pursuit.

So, after 50-some-odd years, I am no longer a nail bitter. It took a cancer diagnosis to do it, but I suppose it's about time. Certainly I'm not crazy about the contributing factor to its cessation, but I am happy with the results. Whatever was in me, in my head, that caused me to constantly bite my nails, seems to be gone. (Some trade-off, now I have malignant tumors in my lungs instead.)

Not to worry. I can live with the change, Hopefully for a long time. However long I do live, though, I will no longer be biting my nails. And for that, I'm thankful. I'm not exactly clear why I stopped but, since we were all never clear why I started, I consider it a net positive. And considering my current health circumstances, I'm grateful – and happy, for anything that's a positive. No mat-




