





Commendation for shelters open during last year's blizzard.

hile most in North ern Virginia pre pare to celebrate the holidays in December, a coalition of churches and non-profit service agencies were scheduled to gather on Dec. 1 for a worship service to kick off the opening of the 2010-2011 Shelter Season at Rising Hope United Methodist Mission Church.

Del. Scott Surovell was going to present Rising Hope Mission Church, New Hope Housing, and VIC-HOP with a General Assembly Resolution commending them for remaining open during the 2010 Blizzards and saving the lives of many individuals who may have otherwise been on the streets.

If someone is in need of overnight shelter, call the Fairfax county non emergency phone line at 703-691-2131, TTY 711. County emergency personnel will work with the caller to determine which shelter option is best. In addition to the county program, throughout the winter in the south county area along the Route One corridor from Dec. 1, 2010 -March 31, 2011, Rising Hope United Methodist Mission Church provides the sheltering site while Ventures in Community (VIC-HOP), a consortium of faith-based communities in the south county area provides meals and overnight volunteers, supported by New Hope Housing, a non-profit organization that operates two county homeless shelters nearby. 

Beware Medical Identity Theft

Seminar educates senior citizens.

airfax County's Office of Cable Communications & Consumer Affairs representative Vee Johnson briefed seniors at the Hollin Hall Community Center recently on ways to protect against medical identity theft.

In her presentation, Johnson pointed out that criminals use both high- and low-tech methods to steal medical and other personal information. She said that there are very sophisticated thieves using a variety of identity theft techniques, but there are also uninsured persons who are interested in helping himself or herself, a friend, or a member of the family who lacks medical insurance and needs medical care that he or she can't afford. One has to be watchful for all types of criminal identity theft which, if it occurs, can affect one's credit rating, cause loss of money or serious legal and privacy rights problems, and even jeopardize one's health because of the insertion of someone else's medical records.

This seminar was co-sponsored by the Fairfax County Cable Communications and Consumer Affairs and Mount Vernon S.A.L.T. (Seniors and Law Enforcement Together).

- Dumpster Diving. They rummage through trash looking for bills or other paper with your personal information on
- Skimming. They steal credit/debit card numbers by using a special storage device when processing your card.
- Phishing. They pretend to be financial institutions or companies and send spam or pop up messages to get you to reveal your personal information.
- Changing your address. They divert your billing statements to another location by completing a change of address form.
- ❖ Old-fashioned stealing. They steal wallets, purses, mail, including bank and credit card statements, pre-approved credit card offers, and new checks or tax information. They steal personnel records from their employers, or bribe employees who have access to personnel records.

In addition to the above, Johnson reviewed consumer protection documents which described the ways one can help identify if one has been a victim of medical identity theft:

- You get a bill for medical services you didn't receive.
- ❖ A debt collector contacts you about a medical

debt you don't owe.

- ❖ You order a copy of your credit report and see medical collection notices you don't recognize.
- You try and make a legitimate insurance claim and your health plan says you've reached your limit on benefits
- ❖ You are denied insurance because your medical records show a condition you don't have.

If anyone experiences any of the above or a combination of these, he or she should report this information to the local consumer consumer affairs agency, the primary care doctor who has been treating him or her, one's medical institution, the financial crimes office of the police department, or the Federal Trade Commission.

PREVENTING MEDICAL IDENTITY THEFT

What should you do to avoid medical identity theft? Johnson listed the following techniques to prevent medical identity theft:

- * Don't give out personal or medical information on the phone or through the mail unless you have initiated the contact and you are certain you know whom you are dealing with.
- ❖ If you keep copies of your medical or insurance records make sure they are secure.
- ❖ Treat your trash carefully. Shred no longer necessary health insurance forms or medical or drug prescription and physician records.
- Make sure the claims paid match the care you received.
- ❖ Periodically order a copy of your credit reports. Why? Because if your credit report reflects debts you are unaware of, it may indicate identity theft has

occurred. The law requires each of three major credit reporting companies to provide you with a free credit report: Equifax, Experian and TransUnion.

- ❖ Order a security freeze. Also known as a credit freeze, it locks down one's credit file and blocks access by potential creditors. It prevents someone from opening up new accounts without approval. Importantly, placing a credit freeze does not affect one's credit score, opening a

new account, or renting an apartment or buying insurance. A credit freeze will cost a nominal fee to place a freeze or lift it.

Here are the three national credit companies that you can order a freeze on your credit file if you suspect that you have been a victim of identity theft:

Multiplex Blues Does Richmond Highway need another big box store?

el. Scott Surovell (D-44) remembers a time when the old drive-in movie theater on Richmond Highway was a neighborhood favorite, offering two screens facing opposite directions with a concession stand in the middle. The delegate admits that he would sometimes look in the wrong direction to sneak a peak at the R-rated movies playing on the other side of the field.

Those days are long gone, and the drivein was replaced by a massive Multiplex in 1986. When it was new, the Multiplex offered one of the best video game selections in the area — everything from Galaga and Ms. Pac Man to Tron. The Multiplex became so popular that a handful of older movie theaters were forced to shut their doors.

Flash forward a decade and AMC began opening movie houses throughout the region with stadium seating. Slowly, the Multiplex became a relic of an earlier time. By the summer of 2007, what had once been the thriving hotspot of Richmond Highway was forced to shut its doors. Since then, the abandoned building has presided over a stretch of the corridor that's particularly clogged — a symbol of how failing transportation infrastructure and sluggish rede-

velopment work hand in glove.

"Redevelopment hasn't happened because traffic is a disaster," said Surovell, a freshman member of the House of Delegates. "That's probably the reason for the limited interest in the site."

NOW BIG BOX retailer Costco is trying to get the necessary approval from the county to construct a massive new store at the site of the old Multiplex. Its first site plan was rejected by a subcommittee of the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens' Associations, but

a reconfigured layout is expected in the coming months. Meanwhile, those who have advocated for redevelopment on Richmond Highway say adding traffic to the existing gridlock would be disastrous.

"If nothing is done to make this intersection better, it's going to be a nightmare," said Kahan Dhillon, chairman of the council's strategic planning committee. "What this area needs is a thorough transpiration analysis and a reconfiguration."

Next week, pieces of the old Multiplex will be auctioned off at a liquidation sale —

deconstructing the building piece by piece. Items will include 3,100 theater seats, concession stands, office furniture and even the outside marquee. The move to get rid of existing assets is a recognition that the days of the Multiplex are officially over. But whatever is replacing them has yet to materialize, prompting a degree of soul searching about the corridor and its future. Some see Costco as a wonderful addition to the community. "They have been a good neighbor in other areas," said Mount Vernon Council co-chairman Al Bommann, adding that he was speaking for himself not the council. "So I would assume they would do the same thing here."

OTHERS ARE skeptical. Yet because there has been no community agreement about the future of Richmond Highway, a sense of uncertainty has created a need for short-term solutions. Until the road can be widened and transit options added to the corridor, Surovell says a Costco would be better than leaving the area vacant. But then there's the question of whether or not adding another big-box retailer is smart growth.

"My constituents keep telling me they are excited about he potential for a Costco here," said Surovell. "But I'm not sure everybody has thought through the traffic implications of what that means."

Holiday Safety Net for Celebrating with Alcohol

Plan ahead, have a designated driver and carry the SoberRide number.

he season for holiday parties is upon us, and with it the increased incidence of driving under the influence. This year, with increased awareness about so-called "distracted driving," it's worth noting that both driving after drinking at a party and using your cell phone while you drive are behaviors you can control.

The possible consequences of driving drunk and underage drinking are often hard to comprehend, but the stories and grief of local families who have lost loved ones to such accidents provide a chilling reminder.

William Cameron Schlifke, born in Fairfax and a graduate of Robinson Secondary School, died Monday, Nov. 24, 2008, less than three days after he was rear-ended in Newport News. He was 22. Schlifke was serving as designated driver for friends in his fraternity at Christopher Newport University. The driver who crashed into him, 20 at the time and also a student at CNU, was arrested at the scene and charged with DUI refusal, reckless driving and underage possession of alcohol, and was convicted of manslaughter.

Unfortunately, such tragedy is not rare. In have been convicted of a crime.

fall 2008, a different young man from Fairfax was sentenced to three years in jail for involuntary manslaughter because of a drunk-driving accident on Dec. 3, 2007 that resulted in the death of one of his friends in the car and permanent injury for another. One family lost a beloved daughter after she clung to life for five brutal days; one family has seen their active son reduced to 70 pounds and "unresponsive" and living in a nursing home.

Such tragedies, if they do not touch us personally, often seem remote. Perhaps in these tough economic times, it's also worth adding up some the financial cost of an arrest for driving under the influence. In Fairfax County, there were more than 3,100 arrests for driving under the influence in 2008. In Arlington, 677 arrests. In Alexandria, 515 arrests. In the City of Fairfax, 181 arrests. Such an arrest is likely to cost as much as \$20,000 or more in legal fees. A conviction results in long term increases in insurances costs of \$1,500 a year or more. A conviction could result in losing a job. And once convicted you'll have to answer "yes" on any job application that asks if you have been convicted of a crime.

DON'T TAKE THE RISK. Plan ahead, leave your car at home, take public transportation, arrange for a designated driver, or choose to abstain if a designated driver isn't available.

But if you find yourself in the unfortunate position of drinking without a safe way home on your own this holiday season, the Washington Regional Alcohol Program has provided you with a safety net called SoberRide. Take their number with you when you head out, and be sure any young adults (must be 21 or over) in your family are similarly armed.

Founded in 1982, WRAP is a public-private partnership working to prevent drunk driving and underage drinking in the Washington-metropolitan area. The program gave more than 500 people a safe ride home on Halloween weekend this year.

Parents are well advised to talk to their teens and let them know that if they find themselves without a safe ride home, that they can call their parents to be picked up. There are consequences of binge drinking for teens that go beyond driving under the influence. But it is also important for parents to let their teens know that whatever happens, it is not OK to drink and drive or to get into a car driven by someone who has been drinking.

pounds of cans, bottles, Styrofoam, and tires from Dyke Marsh tells me that Dyke Marsh has far greater problems than trace amounts of dog poop. Further, commonsense would suggest that the expansive watershed feeding Dyke Marsh, including homes, condominiums, yards, parking lots, roads, gas stations, and a golf course would have far bigger impact on the marsh than a few off leash dogs at Westgrove.

For those who seek to be friendly to Dyke Marsh, a focus on the real threats would be far more productive. The threat of off leash dogs is a red herring.

So is the concern about ground nesting birds at Westgrove. Surely the lawnmowers that have kept Westgrove's fields neatly trimmed for the past 50 years are a bigger problem for these birds.

Another red herring is the issue of E. coli contamination. Those that fear E. coli fail to recognize that this bacteria is a natural part of all of our digestive systems. Normal new born babies get E. coli within hours of birth. Yes, dogs have E. coli too, but then so do all the other mammals that frequent our homes, yards, parks, and marshes. It seems reasonable that dogs that benefit from extensive veterinary care are probably healthier than the wildlife depositing poop in the watershed 24/

Another red herring involves cost and parking. Dog owners need no improvements to make Westgrove viable as an off leash area. Somehow we have done just fine without such



Unequal Opportunity

To the Editor:

We are pleased West Potomac High School administrators responded to our requests to roll back the recently instituted no-penalty cheating and incomplete grading policies

Effective with Friday's message from the West Potomac principal, West Potomac High School has adopted Unified School Discipline Policy where students receive forfeiture of credit for incidents of cheating or plagiarism, thereby ending a period of policies which encouraged cheating and rewarded students for late or no completion of academic work.

We're glad to see that. Those morally-corrupt polices were adopted earlier this Fall to avoid having F grades awarded for cheating and late/incomplete work factored into student grades because inclusion of those failures works against efforts to meet rising federal standards of student / school achievement. The effect of no-penalty cheating and incomplete work was to have fewer F's awarded which is a way to raise student and school grade levels without raising achievement. No Fs for cheating and

incomplete work also – unfortunately - worked to encouraged both bad behaviors.

It was by these two misguided decisions, each with predictable outcomes, that West Potomac lost its way.

However, it remains to be seen whether the rollback of the misguided policies will endure the expected adoption of Mastery Learning, an instructional paradigm favored by the school principal, Mr. Hardison.

Mastery theory, much studied, traces its origin to the '60s. It works well in training environments where students need to achieve a specified level of proficiency in specific tasks and no more. The military services have employed it for years, with modification, in conducting intermediate and advanced training across a spectrum of physical tasks. Mastery assures the lowest common denominator and the brightest student each master the same material; the weakest student can be certified at the end of the course and the organization doesn't "waste" resources "over-training" at the high end.

Assuring all students learn at the same level — and no more — works well for skills such as aircraft and ship systems operations, maintenance and repair. It works less well in educational settings where high levels of learning are the desired outcome and where all students are encouraged to advance to the highest possible levels of learning, the faster the better.

In essence, Mastery works well in training situations; less well in educational set-

tings — both are learning environments but each has different goals.

It may be that West Potomac High School may be contemplating adopting a modified version of Mastery Learning more suitable to education settings; we'll have to see how that goes when the full scope of the program becomes available for review.

If Mastery theory is adopted without modification, however, West Potomac High School students may find themselves back in a situation where there's no-penalty cheating and no F's for late and incomplete work because, in Mastery, both are considered 'behaviors' that do not affect learning grades. Students are graded when they "learn to the standard" — when they have "Mastered" the work. In a hierarchical grading system (letter grades A through F), all students who meet the standard could qualify for an A.

There will be "no" failures, no F's, and no zeros or F's for incomplete work since both failure to learn is not an option and time to learn or complete projects is not a factor. This will certainly have a positive impact on grades where ever it is adopted; the question is, once adopted, how high (or low) is the standard? Will we have to "dumbdown" the curriculum at West Potomac to get there? We hope not.

This situation bears close watching.

It's the planned elimination of Honors Programs that's the most immediate concern now. In its drive to eliminate F's and

thereby report "higher" average grades to please numbercrunchers at the County, State, and Federal level, Fairfax County has embarked on a methodical effort to raise marginal performers by improving their opportunities for learning (and thereby to get higher grades) while eliminating the same opportunity to raise levels of learning among the vast majority of students — those students functioning at a higher level of learning than General Ed course-work but below that of Advanced Placement classes (college credit courses). While hard numbers were not readily available for this paper, in conversation with administrators, it is believed the middle cohort numbers around 1,600 - 1,700 of the approximately 2,200 students at West Potomac or more than 70 percent.

That Fairfax County would adopt an unequal education policy, for any reason, is an insult to those who set the County on a course to establish some of the nation's best school and to those students and parents who rely on our County leadership to set high standards and stay the course.

But, for the County to implement these changes in policy without consultation and, as is suspected, in a naked attempt to raise student and school grades by eliminating consideration of aberrant behavior, shreds the fabric which once held together the County, its schools, teachers, students, and parents.

Why Fairfax County gives special attention and resources to the bottom and the top but not to the vast middle is the question teachers, students, and parents are asking. There is no rationale to provide unequal opportunity to three different groups of students; it's illogical, poor public policy, and a reason to question the fitness of administrators to hold appointed or elected office.

We will press this case and bring

this inequity to the attention of the highest levels; it's an assault on the legacy of those who worked so hard to develop Fairfax County schools to be the envy of the nation - and - it is as immoral as the policies we recently fought so hard and successfully overturned - no F's for cheating and incomplete course work.

This is another key issue facing Fairfax County teachers and parents we are following closely and hope to change.

Fairfax County School Board policies on cheating have not changed; if a student cheats there will be behavioral and academic consequences proportionate to the dishonesty's severity. The School Board did adopt a new grading policy last year, with widespread community support, that brought our policies in line with most other school systems in the country. These policies continue to include "Fs" and "zeros" and timelimited use of incompletes. Information about these policies can be found at our website, www.fcps.edu, or you may email me and I will send them to you.

It was reported that I had not returned phone calls from the reporter. No phone call was received by me from the reporter, who has my cell phone number. It was also reported that the recently organized parent group, "Real World, Real Grades," had not received a return phone call from me. In meeting with group members Tuesday evening, they confirmed that no calls to me had been unreturned and that I had been responsive in our email exchanges.

In my discussions with group members Tuesday, I strongly supported the recent corrective action by the principal to reaffirm School Board policies, as well as the West Potomac High School community reviewing grading, cheating and honors versus Advanced Placement classes issues and considering what is best for our students and community. I expect to be very involved in those discussions as

I remain deeply committed to responding promptly to the needs and concerns of our residents and ensuring that each of our schools provide a very challenging learning environment that enable each and every student to reach their full potential. Thank you.

Wasteful Spending

To the Editor:

It won't be too long before the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors (BOS) will be preparing the county budget. Unfortunately, most politicians usually take the easy way out, as the first order of business, to raise taxes instead of doing their job of making real assessments of all programs and services to determine whether they are essential and, if so, that they are operated efficiently and cost effectively.

As an example of excess spending, the county purchased 672 apartments units for \$107.5 million for an average of \$159, 970 per unit. However, the assessed value at the time for those units was only \$73,621 or only 46.02 percent of what the BOS agreed to pay. The total payment over the assessed value was \$58 million. No small piece of change. Further, when you add the cost of making







them habitable, the county taxpayers really took it on the chin. In this case, if the assessment was correct, the county paid too much for the apartments. If the purchase price was correct, the county under collected real property tax revenue. In either case the taxpayers were the losers. Such excess demands that spending cuts be the first priority not raising taxes.

According to Fairfax County's FY 2009-2010 General Fund Revenue budget table, the county has 130 taxes and fees with real estate taxes deriving the most income for the county. Some of the taxes and fees include a fee for emergency ambulance (sick tax) and a going out of business tax. Also, included are bank franchise tax, cigarette tax, vehicle registration fee, sales tax, electric utility tax, gas utility tax, and electric and natural gas consumption tax. There are another 68 fees of various types for services for a grand total of 198. It appears based on this total that the BOS keeps looking for items to tax and tax. With our economy almost in the tank, now is not the time to be raising taxes. Instead, it is time to cut unnecessary wasteful spending. I provided one example, of a number that I have, to do that.

I encourage all of you to get involved. The more voices the more accountable the supervisors become to their constituents and the better our protection against more taxes and fees imposed on us.

Weak Arguments Against Dog Park

To the Editor:

In her letter of Nov. 24, Glenda Booth points out that "What happens around Dyke Marsh affects Dyke Marsh." Additionally, what happens in Dyke Marsh affects it. Ms. Booth may not be aware of another fact: I'm told that opposition to the proposed dog park, which has resulted in heavy patrolling of the Westgrove property by Fairfax Animal Control officers and their ticketing of dog owners, has resulted in dog owners walking their dogs within the confines of the George Washington Memorial Parkway in and near Dyke Marsh. Why? At that location, they are out of the jurisdiction of Fairfax Animal Control officers.

Responsible pet owners pick up after their pets whether on or off leash and whether at Westgrove or Dyke Marsh. Ms. Booth never mentions all the wild animals that live in and around Dyke Marsh. Are the Friends of Dyke Marsh collecting the feces generated by deer, foxes, raccoons, waterfowl, mice, rats, snakes and others? I daresay the feces left by the dogs of the occasional irresponsible dog owner is comparatively insignificant.

Ms. Booth seeks to complicate the issue by throwing a series of questions at dog park

proponents. She mentions numerous schools and other properties where she would prefer the dog park to go. If every one of them included a dog park, our district would still have only half the number Alexandria City has. She raises the specter of the Resource Protection Area (RPA) that forms a part of the Westgrove property. The dog area would not be located in the RPA.

I wonder if Ms. Booth has been posing a number of questions of the owners of River Towers concerning their vast expanse of impervious area closer to Dyke Marsh than Westgrove where parked cars drip oil and other fluids and concerning their vegetable garden adjacent the RPA? Are River Towers gardeners using fertilizer on their plants? Where does rainwater drain off that impervious area after it has washed those chemicals off the tarmac? The County's watershed management plan found at:

http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dpwes/watersheds/doguecreek_docs.htm identifies two stormwater projects for the River Towers property and none for Westgrove.

In an article published on the internet on Nov. 16, 2010, Ms. Booth quoted Chuck Fox, senior advisor on the Chesapeake Bay and Anacostia River at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency: "Developed areas with large impervious surfaces like parking lots, roofs and highways are a "growing source" of pollution from stormwater runoff." How true, and how applicable to River Towers.

Ms. Booth brings up the Park Authority's non-credible price quotes for a fence, trail and improvements to Fort Hunt Road that I

addressed in an earlier letter. Just another attempted "roadblock."

Ms. Booth's questions were forwarded to Supervisor Hyland in advance of an October meeting he held with dog park proponents. I was told by two of the attendees that Supervisor Hyland indicated Ms. Booth's questions did not dissuade him from supporting the dog park at Westgrove. I'm also told by the same people that our Mount Vernon Park Authority representative said he wants an athletic field at Westgrove but the adjacent neighbors object so he won't encourage anything to be located there. Since he's missed 27 consecutive meetings of the Park Authority Board, there has been no opportunity to confront him on the record in a public forum concerning the issue since June, 2009 when he last attended

The request to create an interim use of Westgrove as an off-leash dog walking park would not be unusual for the Park Authority to approve. As I reported in my letter of Nov. 18, on Nov. 3 the Park Authority Board voted on whether to provide a two-year extension of an interim use of Langley Fork Park in the Dranesville District as a school bus transfer site. One wonders how many dogs it would take to match the carbon footprint of a single school bus.

There is no credible reason to deny 500 petition signers the interim use of the Westgrove property as an off-leash dog walking park, pending the outcome of the master planning process.

West Potomac Girls Looking for Stability

est Potomac senior Alex Jones remembers all the coaching changes, referring to the uncertainty as "tragic." Junior Sofie McMullen recalls a practice or two when the Wolverines didn't have a head coach in the gym.

Turnover has been commonplace for the West Potomac girls basketball program. Terry Newton, 39, enters the 2010-11 campaign as the fourth different

West Potomac head coach in four seasons. Newton took over near the end of last season for Vincent Tate and said he hopes to bring some stability to the program. Newton won his first game as head coach, beating Lake Braddock, but West Potomac dropped its final three games to finish 2-15.

Newton's first step toward turning the program around would be to lay the foundation this season with a team composed of two seniors, three juniors and seven freshmen and sophomores.

"I feel as though in two seasons, we should be in the top

four within [the Patriot] District," Newton said. "The good thing about having a young team, you can sculpt them and develop them into what you want. There's a lot of young talent."

Getting the chance to coach the Wolverines at the end of last year helped bring organization to the offseason and continuity headed into November practices. Newton said the program's numbers were up during offseason conditioning and enough girls tried out that cuts were made.

"It was pretty difficult because ever since I came to West Potomac we've had a different coach every year," Jones said. "No matter if it was freshman or varsity, it's always been a different coach. It was kind of tragic, but we've got to work with [Newton] and now we're used to him. This year it's easier because we have the same coach."

Jones, a 5-foot-7 guard, and 5-foot-8 post Danuelle Doswell are the team's only seniors. McMullen, a 6-foot forward, 5-foot-10 post Caroline Kelly and 5-foot-6 point guard Melanie Boykin are the team's juniors.

"It's been really hard," McMullen said of the coaching changes. "We've had to go from learning different plays and different practice routines, switching

halfway through [last season, to] getting used to not having a coach at some practices, so it's been really hard on all the players.

"[Newton has] been awesome. We love him so much. He saved us last year. He helped us finish our season off. He's been great this year. I think we've definitely improved. We've got a pretty good roster this year. I expect big things."

While the upperclassmen can provide leadership, the future of the program is its talented underclassmen. Newton said sophomores Tayla Dawson (5'3" point guard) and Blossom

Pierre (5'7" guard) and freshmen Resheika Gegory (5'8" forward) and Tajah Staton-Badson (5'6" guard) will be the team's top offensive threats. Sophomores Lindsey Sawczuk (5'5") and Anna Carney (6') and freshman Rosey Sheehan (5'10") will compete for playing time.


